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Note: Current Terminology

Since our formation we have used the word dysphasia (hence our name Dyscover) as a general term to describe the condition of loss of language as a result of stroke, head injury or other illness. Historically the term aphasia was only used to describe the most severe form of the condition where there is total loss of language. Current practice in national, academic and research organisations is to use the term aphasia to describe the whole range of language impairment from severe to mild. We have decided to follow the trend in the professional and academic fields and use the term aphasia.

Aims and mission

Aphasia is a language disability which can result from a stroke, head injury or other illness. This devastating condition affects the person's ability to find words, understand what is being said, read and write.

At Dyscover we aim to provide long term support and opportunities to people with aphasia enabling them to reconnect with life.

We do this by:

- Offering a flexible programme of conversation groups, courses and activities planned and led by speech and language therapists supported by trained volunteers.
- Providing information, support and advice to families and others who seek it.
- Increasing awareness of aphasia by supporting people with the condition to work as Aphasia Ambassadors to speak about their own experiences to the local organisations and community groups.

■ Delivering our innovative services from two centres in Surrey – our main Centre at Walton on the Hill and our satellite group in Kingston upon Thames both responding to the specific needs of people with aphasia in these areas.

Management

The Trustees are pleased to report a successful year and wish to highlight a number of significant successes over this period.

The Trustee Board has reviewed and rewritten the Business Plan, the proposed implementation of which is detailed in a Development Plan.

The Trustees have agreed a new Funding Strategy aiming to broaden our range of funding sources to provide a more stable and sustainable funding base for the future.

Our new Marketing Strategy has led to the revision of our leaflets, posters and display material, as well as a campaign to raise awareness of our services with GPs.

We met the targets set by the Big Lottery Fund at the end of Year 2 of our ASOSS (Aphasia Surrey One Stop Shop) project. More people than ever achieved successful outcomes in improved self confidence, reduced feelings of depression and increased skills and participation.

We established new weekly sessions at our Walton Centre for younger people with aphasia.

In the autumn we held a Conversation Partners Course for 5 couples. We offered a Special Interest programme which included opportunities to meet personal challenges, take up new interests and make new friends.

We relocated our Kingston group to more suitable premises in the Kingston Quaker Centre, in a more central location.

As well as growing the number of Aphasia Ambassadors from 5 to 15 we have widened the number and variety of events they have spoken at including to a group of NHS speech and language therapists, a business breakfast and a local school.



Governance

During the year we have recruited 3 new trustees who have given their time and skills to work alongside the 4 existing ones in order to guide Dyscover through this period of consolidation and future planning. We are pleased to have an active group of trustees with a range of skills who work at a strategic level but are involved and attend the organisation activities. We have a comprehensive recruitment and induction scheme for new trustees and hold an annual trustees' review day. We are extremely grateful to Pam Stone who, as our HR Advisor, completed our regular review of all our Policies and Staff and Volunteer Handbooks bearing in mind new and changing government legislation. Having made the decision not to recruit a CEO the trustees have taken the opportunity to review the staff structure and have agreed a new appointment of a Development Officer who will be responsible for day to day financial matters, coordinating fund raising activities and the implementation of the Funding Strategy, as well as supporting marketing initiatives and researching new opportunities for development.

Staff and volunteers

Without the experience, skills and professionalism of our staff and volunteers we would be unable to offer our services to people with aphasia and their families. Our staff team continues to be ably led by Rosemary Townsend, our Manager of Services, and together the team are totally committed to sustaining and developing services.

We firmly believe that the key to successful long term support of people with aphasia is to ensure all our courses and activities are delivered or managed by speech and language therapists.

The trustees will continue to strive to ensure our funding enables us to do this. Our staff are committed to Continuing Professional Development and attend courses and conferences not only to increase their own skills but where they are able to share the innovative work of Dyscover. Marilyn George continues in her role as Volunteer Coordinator, supported by The Shanley Foundation, Surrey Community Fund and The Hamilton Fund. During the year seven new volunteers have been recruited, trained and taken up specific roles in Dyscover. Most of our volunteers directly support members' activities although some help with other aspects of the organisation such as fundraising, production of our newsletter and administration.



Our services

We continue to offer seven regular weekly conversation support sessions led by staff and volunteers and partly funded by Garfield Weston Foundation and the Childwick Trust. We have maintained and strengthened our partnership working with local speech and language therapy departments who remain our primary referrers. Due to the increase in referrals, particularly of people in the younger age group, we opened a fifth weekly session at our Centre at Walton on the Hill in January.

This group aims to focus on the challenges of adjusting to living with aphasia from both the psychosocial and the communication perspective.

However, as we also recognise that aphasia presents challenges to families and friends as well as the person with the condition we held another of our very successful Conversation Partners Course in September 2014.

We are extremely grateful to the Big Lottery Fund for their grant under our ASOSS (Aphasia Surrey One Stop Shop) project. This has enabled us to focus on individual achievement and to encourage members to set and reach personal goals relating to improved independence, self esteem and participation in their local community. Those people who are able to benefit have achieved some amazing successes which have made a great deal of difference to their lives. For example, Adrian who had his stroke in April last year, described himself as going from his family's 'anchor' to 'a deadweight'. Since joining our learning to live with aphasia group, he has grown hugely in confidence and self esteem, and this has motivated him to volunteer as an Aphasia Ambassador, to participate in a range of extra activities and join a 2 day trip to the National Stroke Assembly in Nottingham.

For those people too elderly or too frail to meet new personal challenges Dyscover offers less structured sessions, providing stimulating conversation in a supportive and sensitive environment and gives much needed respite for carers.

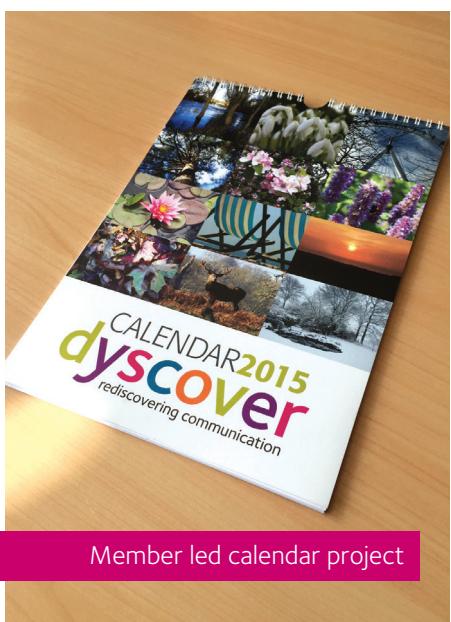


Photography field trip to Kew

Our Special Interest Programme continues to enhance our main services and this year we have been able to use part of our Big Lottery Fund grant to develop this. Members have participated in a wide variety of activities and events from whole group social outings such as a Thames boat trip to individual challenges such as the popular Companion Cycling in Bushy Park and Sailing with Sailability.

In response to the needs and interests of our younger members, we organised a bespoke outdoor challenge day at High Ashurst Activity Centre, in which 7 members took on challenges such as a climbing wall and low ropes course. There was laughter, encouragement and tears of joy when everyone realised how much they could achieve.

Creative activities with less reliance on language are a useful medium for expression and recreation. Photography has featured highly this year, members having been inspired to lead their own 6 week photography summer course, which included field trips to Richmond Park, Kew, Hampton Court and Brighton beach.



Member led calendar project

Outcomes of the course included a 2015 calendar and an article in the magazine of The Disabled Photographers' Society, together with enthusiasm to develop members' skills through another course next year.

Art sessions led by a professional artist in our Easter break have extended members' skills and interest and we will be following this up with future courses.

Another member led initiative this year has been a Dyscover book club, in which 5 members meet weekly to support one another in developing their skills and enjoyment of reading. Our local library has advised us, and loaned a range of adult appropriate books with simplified language which members have found encouraging and which has built confidence.



Finally, singing with the Dyscover choir has remained a popular and uplifting activity for a mixed group of members, relatives and volunteers.

People with aphasia often experience more fluency when singing than speaking and enjoy the sense of achievement when performing to an audience.

Relatives of our members with aphasia have also benefitted from our regular programme of informal social support led by a member and relative. In addition we have held a 5 week course for carers led by a professional counsellor exploring the psychological impact of aphasia.

Our Kingston satellite continues to flourish, partly supported by the Royal Borough of Kingston, and we were particularly pleased to be able to move premises to the new Kingston Quaker Centre right in the middle of the town.

We are extremely grateful for the warm welcome they have given us and the group have settled well into the highly suitable premises.

Our lease at our main Centre at Walton on the Hill runs until December 2017 and we are aware that this may well not be renewed and we will have to move to alternative premises before that date. With that in mind we are actively looking for new suitable premises within the local area.



Developing skills and confidence at Sailability

Our plans for the future

We plan to establish a new post of Development Officer who will be responsible for leading the business and development aspects of Dyscover.

We are planning to deliver a new innovative project, which will also include carers, offering a short course and longer term ongoing support to a group of people with a type of dementia known as Primary Progressive Aphasia. We are working closely on the project with colleagues at UCL and we are pleased and proud to be at the forefront of this work.

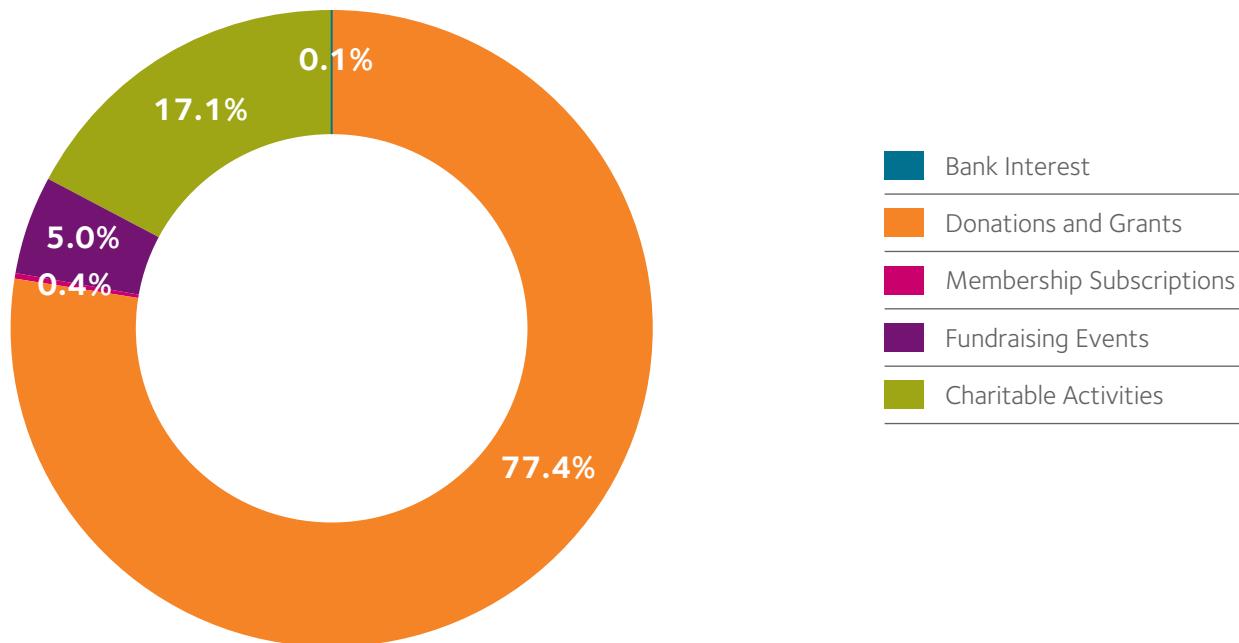
Over the next three years we plan to develop our Kingston satellite to offer a more comprehensive range of services to an increased number of members.

- We will assess our future accommodation needs and seek out new premises for a possible move in 2017.
- We will explore potential for partnership working with other organisations both locally and regionally.

Analysis of income

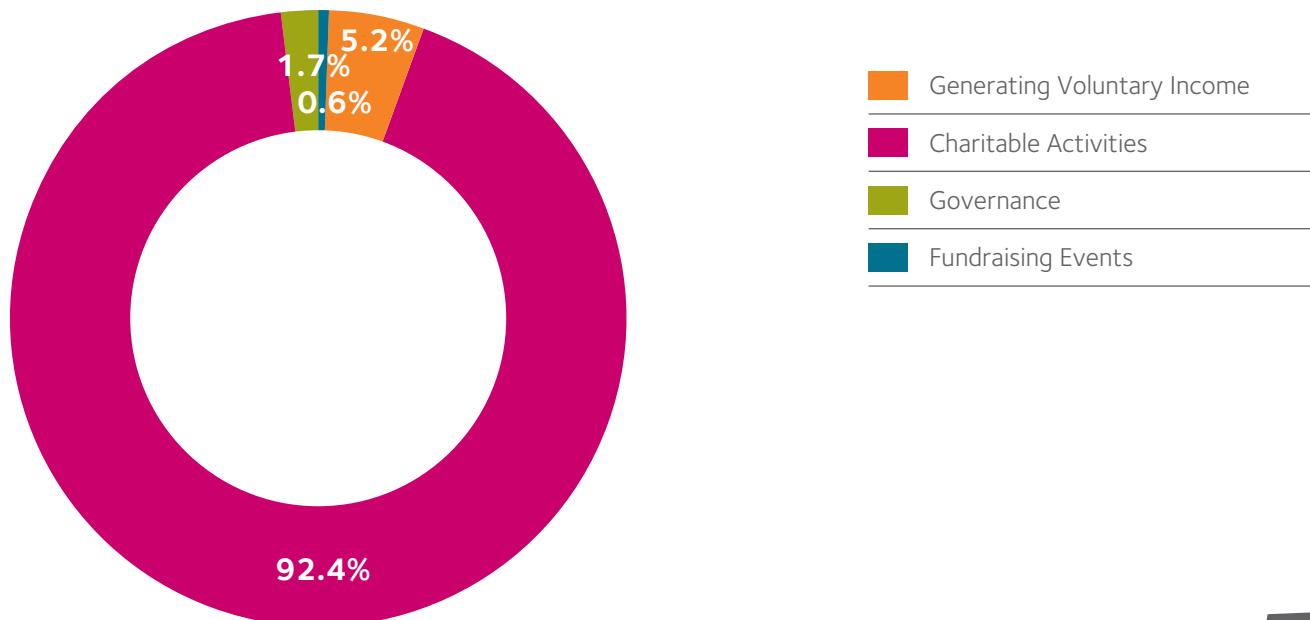


Revenues from donations and grants increased this year over the previous year as a result of significantly higher donations from individuals and local organisations. Unrestricted income from grant making trusts has improved at £22,175, although still adversely affected by the state of the British economy. Total incoming resources for the year were £199,940.

Total resources expended during the year reduced to £137,456, with the loss of our Chief Executive, of which £127,077 was spent on charitable activities, £8,002 was the cost of generating funds and £2,377 was the cost of governance. This resulted in an overall increase in funds of £62,484, of which £49,509 was on unrestricted funds.

Overall funds carried forward at 31st March 2015 stood at £132,349, representing a little over eleven months of the forecast total expenditure for the current year. This meets the Trustee Policy of retaining a fund equivalent to between 6 and 12 months expenditure.

Analysis of expenditure





We are very grateful for the generous donations made by individuals during the year, which totalled £48,763.

We would also like to thank all those who took part in sponsored events which raised £2,718. The value of the donations and sponsorship has been significantly increased by the willingness of individuals to complete Gift Aid declarations and this is much appreciated.

Those involved with fundraising events have continued their good work this year and there have been several successful events. These included concerts arranged by Fundraising Friends and stalls at local fairs organised by our volunteer community fundraiser with help from members, their relatives and volunteers. Our thanks go to all those who have given their time and support to make these and other events possible, raising £9,098.

Our thanks are also due to Nick Clark for his hard work in the successful running of the Top Draw Club and to the generous support of its many members. The Top Draw Club is a quarterly prize draw competition regulated under the provisions of the Gambling Act 2005.

The donations from local clubs and societies continue to be a valuable source of income amounting to £17,428 and their generosity is much appreciated. We should also like to thank all the grant making trusts and local companies that have supported us for their generous support during the year. A detailed list is to be found at the end of this document.

The accounts distinguish between restricted and unrestricted funds and indicate the amounts expended during the period in each category. This distinction is more fully explained in Note 1 to the Accounts.

Risk Management and Internal Control

The Trustees have continued to assess the major risks to which Dyscover is exposed. The Board are satisfied that Dyscover has established review systems that under normal circumstances, should allow these risks to be managed and mitigated to an acceptable level in its day-to-day operations.

The Board maintains and monitors an established system of financial controls appropriate to the size and nature of the organisation, including budgetary control and reviewing the annual budget. Particular attention is paid to the balance between income and expenditure and the amount necessary to be retained in reserves.

We have a regular review schedule of Dyscover's policies and procedures including: health and safety, equalities and diversity, recruitment and selection, as well as the services provided by Dyscover, with a view to mitigating any associated risks.

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

Company Law requires the Directors, who are also the Charity's Trustees, to prepare financial statements for each financial year that give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Charity and of the surplus or deficit of the Charity for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- i select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;
- ii make judgements and estimates which are reasonable and prudent;
- iii state whether applicable accounting standards and statements of

recommended practice have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;

- iv prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the Charity will continue on that basis.

The Trustees have overall responsibility for ensuring that the Charity has appropriate systems of control, financial and otherwise. They are also responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose, with reasonable accuracy at any time, the financial position of the Charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006 and the Charities Acts. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Charity including taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Public Benefit

Dyscover's charitable activities focus on providing long-term support and opportunities for people with Aphasia and their families. The Charity has referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing its aims and objectives and in planning future activities. In particular, the Trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set and they value the continuance of robust impact reporting to substantiate the outcomes.

Notes to the Accounts



Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year ended 31st March 2015



1. Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008) and the Companies Act 2006. In preparing the financial statements the Charity follows best practice as laid down in the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2005.

Depreciation Policy

Provision for depreciation of fixed assets held for use by the Charity is made at annual rates calculated to spread the cost (less anticipated residual disposal value) of each asset evenly over its expected life. The depreciation rate currently in use for Furniture and Fittings is 20% on cost. Equipment acquired by using Restricted Funds is written off in full in the year of purchase.

Funds Accounting

Restricted Funds are funds that are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors. Any expenditure incurred on a specific project in excess of restricted funds available will be treated as expenditure from Unrestricted Funds.

Unrestricted Funds are Accumulated Funds that are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the Charity and which have not been designated for any other purposes.

Incoming Resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when received. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included in these accounts.

Resources Expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred and includes any VAT which cannot be recovered which is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. Governance costs include those costs associated with the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the fees of the independent examiner and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity.

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the SoFA on the basis of actual costs incurred on a particular activity, thereby reflecting the use of the resource.

2. Trustees' Remuneration and Expenses

No remuneration directly or indirectly out of funds of the Charity was paid or payable for the period to any Trustee or to any person or persons known to be connected with any of them.

Trustees have been reimbursed £425 travelling expenses (2014: £409) claimed in carrying out their duties.

The Charity has put in place Trustee Indemnity insurance as part of its overall indemnity insurance at an annual premium including Insurance Premium Tax of £198 (2014: £431).

3. Taxation

As a registered charity, Dyscover Ltd is exempt from tax on its charitable activities. No tax charges have arisen in the current or previous year.
