#### **BAS** conference

In September the SLTs each attended part of the **British Aphasia Society Conference.** 

In October they then met to discuss what they had learnt and ideas to **improve the support we offer members.** Barbara Greenwood (Speech and language therapist - external facilitator) ioined in for these discussions which included:

- thinking about how we discuss differences and similarities in people with aphasia
- considering how we can address
   difficulties with numbers and calculations
- sharing ideas and experiences in using group projects to practise and improve communication.

#### **Practice educators**

Maggie and Emma attended the Practice Educators course hosted by City St George's University London, as Dyscover will be offering placements to their students of Speech and Language Therapy. Maggie found the section on giving feedback was particularly relevant to her role at Dyscover, supporting volunteers to reflect during group debriefings. ### Raising aphasia awareness

To link in with World Stroke Day, our groups looked at ways of raising awareness of aphasia. An estimated 90% of people do not know what it is.

The Tuesday afternoon Zoom group highlighted how aphasia is different for everyone and listed 'space to talk' and 'patience' as two key supportive strategies

The Kingston group talked about the value of an ID card, with information about aphasia to explain their difficulties to strangers.

Aphasia Awareness continued with the training of volunteers and new staff. One of the activities included communicating about an activity either without using verbs, using only drawing or using only gesture.

They reported finding this frustrating and challenging, demonstrating some of the challenges people with aphasia regularly face.

Volunteer Ros introduced Thursday afternoon members to the **board game Blokus** on the last



day of term. The aim is to fit as many of your coloured pieces on the board, while strategically blocking opponents. Members enjoyed using spatial reasoning, visualisation and problem solving skills.

### **Spotlight on Martin H**



Kingston member Martin lived in two different worlds when he was growing up. He was born in the UK, but when he was just six his parents sent him back to Jamaica to live with his grandmother on the family fruit farm.

He returned to the UK at the age of 17 and attended a short multi-skills course in Birmingham. He really enjoyed plastering and completed an apprenticeship.

Martin's job took him to London, where he worked on a number of important buildings, including the House of Lords. Martin set up his own company in 1997, running it very successfully for over 20 years. His life changed

after a severe stroke in 2018.

Thankfully, he regained full movement, but his speech was badly affected. It has gradually come back and his group have noticed a great improvement while he has been at Dyscover. Martin really enjoys the group chats and being with people who understand about his aphasia. The friendships he has made are really important to him. "We have a laugh," he says.

He is able to read and write small amounts and challenges himself to improve. Martin loves his independence and regularly uses the Tube, practising the names of all the stations on his route. His ultimate aim is to improve so much that he can return to work.

Martin and his wife Maxine have two daughters, Stephanie and Leah. Another of Martin's big loves is cricket. He has played on overseas tours and has won lots of cups and medals. He is also a great fan of Reggae music.

### Have you Heard

#### PPA - celebrating 10 years

2025 marks ten years since we ran our first courses for people with Primary Progressive Aphasia (PPA) at Dyscover. PPA is a rare dementia in which communication difficulties are the first symptom. Since 2022, Rosemary has focussed on growing the service, receiving over 120 referrals in the past two years.

To our knowledge, Dyscover is still the only charity in the UK offering specialist speech and language therapy (SLT) for people with PPA and their families.

In November **local MP**, **Helen Maguire** (*right with Rosemary*), visited Dyscover and is supporting our campaign to improve access to SLT for people with a diagnosis of PPA.
